RECOMMENDATION:

ADOPT RESOLUTION NO. 15-1729 AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ADOPT A MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL MULTI-HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN FOR THE REDUCTION OF HAZARD RISK TO THE COMMUNITY.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of the Plan is to identify natural hazards that impact the various jurisdictions located within Maricopa County, assess the vulnerability and risk posed by those hazards to community-wide human and structural assets, develop strategies for mitigation of those identified hazards, present future maintenance procedures for the plan, and document the planning process.

BACKGROUND AND COMMUNITY BENEFIT:

The Multi-Jurisdictional Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan was established with the Maricopa County Department of Emergency Management in 2002. The Plan recommends several hazard mitigation actions/projects that will provide mitigation for specific natural hazards that impact the City of Goodyear, with the effect of protecting people and property from loss associated with those hazards.

PREVIOUS ACTIONS AND DISCUSSION:

In October of 2008, Maricopa County Department of Emergency Management (MCDEM) initiated a planning process with local and tribal jurisdictions to consolidate and update the 2004 Plans into a true multi-jurisdictional plan with annexes for the tribal elements corresponding to the Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation and the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community. The resulting 2009 Maricopa County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan, complete with tribal annexes and herein referred to as the 2009 Plan, was submitted to FEMA and received official approval on April 30, 2010. The 2009 Plan is at the end of the 5-year planning cycle and expired on April 30, 2015. In early 2014, MCDEM worked to successfully secure grant funding to perform the required 5-year update.

FISCAL ANALYSIS:

None. Approval of the plan will provide a source of funding through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program and FEMA assistance.
