Focus ranges from arts and quality of life to core human and social services.

FY2015-16 HIGHLIGHTS IN THE FIRST SIX MONTHS:

- 9,000+ Goodyear residents have benefited from services provided by funded agencies.
- Goodyear Lion's Club provided vision screening to 871 Goodyear children (and 460 Avondale children) at various local schools, including eight elementary schools that were not previously served.
- Helping Families in Need assisted 241 Goodyear residents in applying for healthcare, and/or nutrition assistance, including other state benefits such as TANF.
- Mission of Mercy, Inc. provided primary medical care for 96 Goodyear residents.
- Southwest Lending Closet loaned durable medical equipment at no charge to 891 Goodyear residents up 30% from the previous year.

2016-17 Process

- Applications opened March 29 and were due May 1.
- Announcement was posted on the Goodyear website home page and on Goodyear social media. FY2015-16 applicants, members of the Faith Community Roundtable, local media contacts, and local and regional non-profit groups were notified via email.
- Applications are evaluated based on number of Goodyear residents served and whether the service is unique in Goodyear or replicated by another organization.
- Budget FY2016-17 = \$114,400

2016-17 Applications

- 35 applications submitted; 7 new applicants.
- A total of \$284,595 was requested.
- Health & Human Services providers, including churches, shelters, food banks, and those who deliver victim services, medical, mental and behavioral health, and services for children and seniors.
- 27 applications advanced for funding.
