| Agua Fria Food and Clothing Bank | \$12,000 | \$15,000 | \$ 12,000 | \$ 15,000 | The total cost for this project is significant, so any amount would be a blessing that will be added to a variety of contributions from other cities, businesses, churches, and individuals. | The mission of the Agua Fria Food and Clothing Bank as a faith-based, Non-Profit Organization, is to provide services to families and individuals in the Southwest Valley who are hungry, in need, or facing crisis. | <p>In 2018, the Agua Fria Food and Clothing Bank (AFFCB) gave 10,325 emergency food boxes to families experiencing hunger in the Southwest Valley. A large portion of the food served (71,530 pounds) was donated by local grocery stores. Along with food from food drives hosted at schools or businesses, and end-of-day donations at restaurants like Dickey’s, Red Lobster, and Pizza Hut, all donated food from grocers must be picked up by the food bank.</p> <p>Our service area, over 400 square miles of territory, includes zip codes in Avondale, Goodyear, Tolleson, Cashion, Buckeye, Litchfield Park, Tonopah, Arlington, Palo Verde, and Harquahala. We pick up food from grocery stores and restaurants on a weekly basis, sometimes driving 1,000 miles in a week.</p> <p>We currently own three vehicles: a 2005 Chevy Express Cargo Van; a 1995 Ford box truck; and a 1995 International. All three vehicles are high-mileage and have increasing maintenance and repair expenses. The 1995 International has been inoperable since November 2018 which forced us to have to borrow and rent trucks to help us get through our busiest donation season of the year. Without a reliable fleet of vehicles, we would be unable to pick up the food needed to serve our community.</p> <p>AFFCB also takes proper food storage and transportation very seriously and is committed to ensuring that donated product maintains appropriate temperatures. For that reason, the new van and truck we are looking to purchase would both have refrigeration capabilities. With an investment of \$15,000 the City of Goodyear can help us leverage funds we received from the City of Goodyear in 2018, as well as contributions from the Association of Arizona Food Banks, from a couple local churches, and from our upcoming fundraising event, to guarantee the purchase of two new refrigerated vehicles.</p> <p>The Agua Fria Food and Clothing Bank believes the West Valley is an incredible place to live, work, and play. Caring Circles uses AmeriCorps Members 55 and older to provide social support to older adults who are on the waiting list for formalized services. Caring Circles AmeriCorps Members serve 20 hours a week, receive a stipend and other benefits for their service. They are organized geographically to build circles of care in the local neighborhood where the client lives. This includes recruiting volunteers to assist the AmeriCorps Members and clients in helping with their unmet social support needs like transportation to medical appointments, grocery shopping or food box delivery, prescription pick-up or friendly visiting. AmeriCorps Members visit the client in their home, identify their needs and then look for volunteers from that same geographic area. The goal of Caring Circles is to serve 1500 clients per year with 80% feeling increased social support. The program’s emphasis on recruiting volunteers from the client's geographic area promotes an aging in place model where the community can help meet its citizens’ needs. Funding would be used to pay for mileage of the AmeriCorps Members as they serve clients in Goodyear.
