# Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

#### Introduction



 Purpose: Provide decent housing, suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunities primarily to low and moderate income persons

### Types of CDBG Programs




- Urban County Program

### Urban County Program

- Maricopa County is designated as an "Urban County"
- Competitive grant application process
  - Includes Buckeye, El Mirage, Gila Bend, Goodyear, Guadalupe, Litchfield Park, Queen Creek, Tolleson, Wickenburg, Youngtown, unincorporated Maricopa County
- CDAC recommends funding levels to County BOS

# Urban County Program






### Entitlement Community Program

- Must be formally invited by HUD
  - Goodyear was invited in 2008, 2010, 2014, 2017
  - Current 3-year agreement with County expires June 30, 2021
- City receives an annual allocation from HUD

### Urban County Projects



#### **TYPES OF PROJECTS & PROGRAMS**

- Must be eligible & meet a national objective
- Conform to National CDBG process and program implementation standards, spending caps & oversight
- Relevant to the Five-Year Consolidated Plan

#### FY2021 CDAC Priorities

- 1. Public safety, general infrastructure, public facilities/community centers
- 2. ADA improvements, eliminate slum & blight, fire protection, housing
- 3. Owner occupied housing rehab, economic development, park improvements

### Entitlement Funding - example

#### CDBG

Allocation Breakdown	
Allocation	\$400,000
Administration	-\$80,000
Available for Eligible Programs/Projects	\$320,000

Administrative Costs Capped at 20% Minimum 70% for Low/Mod Income Projects



### Entitlement Funding - example

#### CDBG

Available for Eligible Programs/Projects	\$320,000
Low/Mod (required)	\$224,000
Slum/Blight or Urgent Need	\$96,000 (maximum)



**Public Services** 

\$48,000 (maximum)

Slum/Blight must be in a Designated Redevelopment Area Urgent Need = Disaster Response Maximum 15% for Public Services (direct services)

# Urban County Administration

#### CURRENT STATE

- Participate in Environmental Review
- Contribute data to Consolidated Plan
- Contribute content to CAPER
- Quarterly Reports
- Grant Management contracts, records, Davis-Bacon, financial
- Audited by County
  Estimate 10% of Staff Lead's time

### Entitlement Administration



#### PRE-AWARD/ONE-TIME

- Five-Year Consolidated Plan
  - Affordable housing
  - Homeless
  - Impediments to Fair Housing
  - Community development needs, priorities, activities
- Annual Action Plan
- Develop Policies & Procedures

Estimated Total Cost \$50,000 CDBG Administrative Costs Capped at 20%

### Entitlement Administration



#### ONGOING – LOCAL FUNDING WILL BE NEEDED

- One full time employee dedicated to program
  - Annual Action Plan
  - CAPER
  - IDIS reporting
  - Environmental Reviews, Labor Compliance
  - Fair Housing training and complaints
  - Audited by HUD

Estimated Total Cost \$150,000 CDBG Administrative Costs Capped at 20%

# Advantages & Disadvantages



### 3-Year Renewal with County

#### URBAN COUNTY PROGRAM

#### Advantages

- The County does most of the work.
- Can be managed by current staff.
- Bigger pool of resources to absorb capped activities.

#### Disadvantages

- The City is not guaranteed funding each year.
- Project funding is bound by CDAC priorities.
- The City cannot use funds for administrative costs.



### Separate from the County

#### ENTITLEMENT

#### Advantages

- Guaranteed annual funding based on federal budget.
- 20% can be used for administrative costs.
- Flexibility in the types of projects.
- Opens door to Section 108 Loan program.

#### Disadvantages

- Intensive start-up effort.
- Ultimately need dedicated staff.
  - Administrative cap will not cover annual costs for FTE, general fund subsidy would be needed

#### Staff recommendation



• Accept HUD's invitation to become an Entitlement Community Grantee effective FY2022.
